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# General Manager's Report by Janice Griffith



January arrived and with it our best-ever attended Open House on January 7 when 1274 people came though our doors. See a full report on page 2 of this newsletter, and check the upcoming events section for all the interesting and fun offerings coming up.

The big piece of news is of course, our new Curator. We are so very fortunate to have **Dr. James Raffan** join us for 30% of his time, and grateful to the private donors

who have made it possible. See page 3 for more on Dr. Raffan.

We welcome **Jen Burnard** to the Education Coordinator's position – job sharing with **Carolyn Hyslop**. Our Education programs have grown to the extent that coordinating them requires full-time attention. Jen is no stranger to us as she has been a long-time volunteer and animator. Jen and Carolyn are busy planning March Break and Summer Camps, and the Teachers' Institute for August.

We now have paid weekend duty officers to open and close the museum and to fill in the gaps in coverage in the store and on the front desk. Christine Miller, Katie Nice, Luc Demarais, Jen Burnard and Glen Caradus are on a rotating schedule to fill this function. Thanks to the volunteers who continue to keep us open and running. Without all of you, we could not do what we do.

We are very close to an announcement of a new Marketing Coordinator's position. I have been working with the Wage Subsidy program and have verbal confirmation of funding as I write this.

Things are looking up for the exterior of our building! The colourful banners designed by **Neil Broadfoot** were installed along our streetscape January 20, just in time to welcome guests to the Fundraising Dinner that evening in cooperation with **Kenner Collegiate**. The new illuminated sign was a donation from **Trent Glass**, refurbished by **Zeebons**.

Several of us attended the Wilderness Canoe Symposium in Toronto Feb. 2 and 3. A fund in memory of **Herb Pohl**, who died tragically on Lake Superior last summer, has been established here at the Museum. The funds will be used in some way to assist researchers to access information. Initially, it will help with the resource library, and with searchable database software.

Both the City of Peterborough and the County of Peterborough have provided us with funding towards operations since 2004. Every year we attend Council meetings for both to thank them, update them on how we're doing, and ask for support in the upcoming year. This year, the County of Peterborough gave us a very pleasant surprise! Subject to final budget deliberations, County Councillors voted to double the funding they have been giving us, and gave us a standing ovation for the turnaround the Museum has achieved since 2004. We will be in front of City Council in a few weeks.

### January Open House Report Story and photos by Mollie Cartmell

With "Transportation" as the theme, the Canoe Museum Annual New Years' Open House, held on January 7th, 2007 was by far the most successful to date; a total of 1,274 took part, including many families with small children. (A volunteer arriving only a few minutes after the noon start-time came in breathless, with the news that the parking-lot was already full!)

The Peterborough Model Railroad Club, museum partner in the event, brought a new demographic to the museum in general, as well as a related dimension to the Open House and was a big part of its success.

Museum board-members were greeting visitors at the door, and their entirely unscientific poll indicated that for at least 50%, this Open House was a first-visit to the museum!

Tours, both formal and informal, (Collections Manager **Kim Watson** was giving her family a tour and suddenly realized she

had another twenty people following her around !) and the Folk-lore Circle were all very wellreceived; artisans were in great demand; viewing in the workshop, Traditional Skills Gallery and "Ipie's Workshop" was two or three deep all afternoon.

The popular PMR display consisted of their award-winning 10 x 20 HO scale,

model-train layout specifically reflecting the canoe/train relationship, as well as a selection of dioramas. The train-colouring-table and the wooden-train model provided by



The Toy Shop (Peterborough) were swarmed by small children all afternoon.

Along with numerous locations in southern Ontario, a cross section of "place of Wales, internationally.

And among the many positive comments ... "Wonderful place to visit, deserves all necessary funding to keep it

open" and "Former critic, new member" were most satisfying.

The value-added of 1,274 participants means ancillary activities also had an excellent Open House the museum store set a single-day record, while membership sales, canoe-raffle sales and donations were all very encouraging.

# Dr. James Raffan Appointed as Curator Submitted by Janice Griffith, General Manager

The Canadian Canoe Museum proudly announces the appointment of **Dr. James** 

Raffan as part time curator. James Raffan is one of Canada's foremost authorities on canoeing and wilderness experience. Having come up through the ranks of Kirk Wipper's famously canoecentric Camp Kandalore from 1959-1973, James went on to become a member of the Ontario Recreational Canoeing Association team that created its first set of standards and teaching progressions for flatwater, canoe tripping, and whitewater paddling. He was an instructor at the first Moving Water Instructor's School at

Madawaska Canoe Camp in 1980 and directed the program in 1981, '83 & '84. For several years he was a river guide for Black Feather Wilderness Adventures in Northern Saskatchewan and the Northwest Territories and has since kept up an active winter and summer tripping program.

For contributions to the growth and development of canoeing in Canada, and in particular, for his work in organizing the a first national conference (and book) on the canoe in Canadian culture, Raffan was presented with an Award of Merit from the Canadian Recreational Canoeing Assocation. Raffan was profiled as a distinguished

Canadian paddler in Paddle Quest (Boston Mills Press). He has won awards for dem-



onstrating and developing leadership in young people in outdoor education and outstanding contribution to the development and promotion of outdoor education from the Council of Outdoor Educators of Ontario. He is a Fellow and past Governor of the Royal Canadian Geographical Society, past Chair of the Arctic Institute of North America and received the Queen's Golden Jubilee Medal in 2002 for his contributions to these organizations.

Back from recent lecture tours in Canada, Australia and the United Kingdom as Canada's unofficial canoe ambassador, JR is a Patron of the Canadian Parks and Wilder-

ness Society's Boreal Program, and longtime booster and member of the exhibit design team of the Canadian Canoe Museum in Peterborough. He is author and editor of books including his best-selling biography of Bill Mason, Fire in the Bones, and Deep Waters: Courage Character and the Lake Temiskaming Canoeing Tragedy, he has written for National Geographic and Canadian Geographic, as well as for radio, film & television. Rapid Magazine ranked his book Summer North of Sixty in 2004 as #3 in the Top 10 List of canoeing's all-time great reads, behind Dangerous River (R.M. Patterson) and The Lonely Land (Sigurd Olson). His work has been translated into French, German and Italian and, with 2006 debut, a selection of his canoe writings has inspired a new wilderness suite called "Tumblehome" by Canadian composer, David Reed."

James has been the force behind procuring the *Temiskaming* canoe and funding to develop the exhibit. He assisted in its design. He is also the driving force behind the very popular *Canoe Songs I* and *Canoe Songs II* CD's available in our store.

We welcome Dr. Raffan to his new role and thank the private donors who have made his appointment possible.

### **Canoe Building Workshops**

This summer, we are running two canoe-building courses at the museum.

Over the course of eight days, participants will build either a wood and canvas canoe, or a wood-strip canoe. What is the difference in these types of canoes?

The wood and canvas canoe is made in the traditional manner, fastening steambent ribs and planking over a form with clinched brass canoe tacks. The formed hull is enveloped with a layer of watertight canvas. This is a true classic with over a century of tradition.

The modern method of wood-strip canoe building is made by joining narrow, flexible strips of red cedar together over a form, and sealing both sides of the canoe with a layer of clear fibreglass. This method produces a lightweight hull, and allows the beauty of the wood to be appreciated inside and out.

At the end of both classes, a lottery-style draw will be held, and the winning student will take home the canoe for the additional cost of materials

# Volunteer Profile – Don Rankin by Gwyneth Hoyle

In a small room, tucked away upstairs in the Administration corridor of the Canoe Museum, is a photographic record of not only a large part

of the collection, but also all of the important events in the life of the museum. Don Rankin, quiet and unassuming, is the man behind the camera, and the man who has organized this vast quantity of pictures into albums in which they are readily accessible.

Don made his first appearance in connection with the museum in May of 1996 when he joined eighteen other

paddlers in a Glenn Fallis Voyageur canoe, following the route of Champlain from Ste. Marie among the Hurons, to arrive in Peterborough in time for the first display of the canoe collection to the public in the building

which now houses it. The trip enjoyed fine days with frosty nights at the beginning, with cold gusty rain for their arrival and the


ceremonial portage of the big canoe to the Collection Centre.

Retired from his work in charge of Student Services at Peterborough Collegiate, Don had been interested in volunteering at the museum, and when the Collections Manager at the time, Dawn McColl, found out that one of his hobbies was photography, his role was settled. His first major

assignment was to photograph each of the canoe and kayak models, followed by each of the paddles in the collection. As well about sixty of the full-sized craft have been documented, a labour intensive procedure

with 50-70 pictures for each canoe, showing every detail. He also documented with his camera the earliest displays, and every phase of the work which transformed the original office building into the current exhibition space. When **Walter Walker** built the basswood canoe, Don Rankin was there to make still shots while the video was being filmed.

In addition to providing an archival record, Don's slides have been used for fund-raising presentations in Peterborough, To-ronto and farther afield. At the time the museum had its six-month closure, he was working with another volunteer, Reuben Ware, a professional archivist, to create a program in which every slide and print of the collection could be put on a computer and eventually accessed on the Internet, as is done at major museums. The embryonic beginnings of this project awaits funding and personnel to complete this worthwhile endeavour, and Don will be there to show the way.
